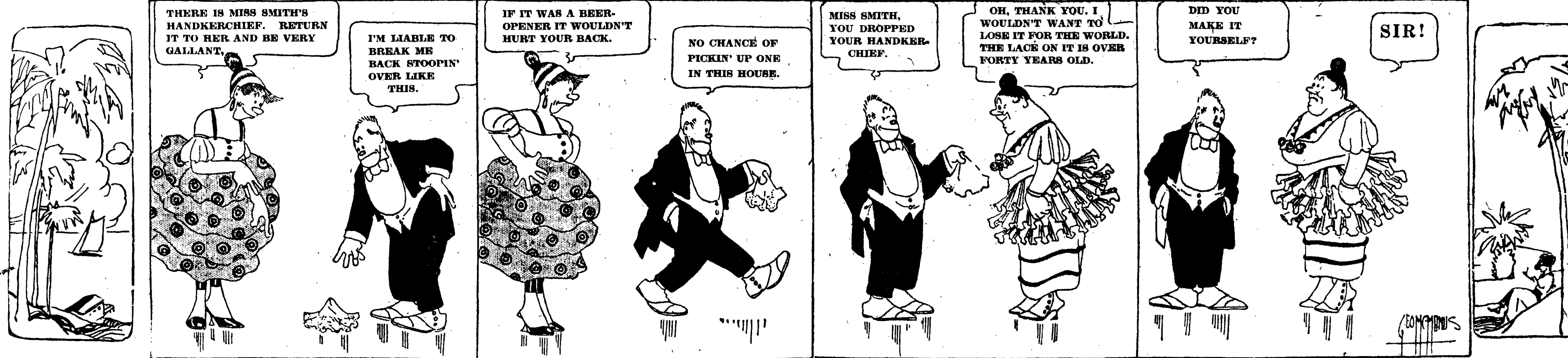

U. S. PREPARES PROTEST AGAINST RED CROSS BAN

The reason for this view of the obligations of Great Britain under the Geneva convention of 1906 were set forth in a communication by the undersigned to the American Ambassador, under date of December 30, 1915, and a copy of this was transmitted to your department.

DEFINITELY WITHDRAWS CONSENT.

We are now in receipt of a communication from your department, in which you announce that the British government, in which it definitely withdraws its consent for the shipment of such articles by the American Red Cross, and that when the matter is in the hands of the British government, it will be allowed safe conduct to their destination.

IN VIEW OF THE FACT THAT THE GERMAN GOVERNMENT DID CONSENT TO A RECIPROCAL COURSE ON OCTOBER 1915.

In view of the fact that the German government did consent to a reciprocal course on October 1915, and in accordance with article 29, and that fact was communicated to the British foreign office, as we are advised by the British Ambassador at Washington, we venture to hope that the conclusion of the British government was based on a misconception, and that when the matter is called to its attention a change in this policy may be had.

U-BOAT ISSUE CLOSED.

The facts, however, the United States may make indirect inquiry to learn just what form of punishment the submarine commanders received.

INDemnITY TO BE CONSIDERED.

The matter of indemnity will be taken up by diplomatic means, probably by negotiations between Secretary Lansing and the German ambassador at Washington.

LATEST NOTE RECEIVED IN BERLIN.

Secretary Lansing received a cablegram from Ambassador Gerard, announcing the delivery of the President's latest note to the Berlin foreign office yesterday.

NO ISSUE IN CYPRIC CASE.

It was made plain at the State Department yesterday that in making inquiry as to the facts in the Cypric case, it did not necessarily follow that the United States intended to make an issue over this case, no matter what facts might develop.

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
